1.0 EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The project was initiated to support internally displaced persons due to banditry and cattle rustling. The project through meetings with leaders and other resource persons was able to verify the number of households affected and displaced families in Baringo County. The project identified 2no. Locations Loruk and Baraketio with 539no. Households identified in the respective locations.

The purpose of the project was to provide mitigations by supporting vulnerable community members negatively affected by displacements due to banditry and cattle rustling. Therefore, the project was based on addressing key challenges related to insecurity based on the following rationale;

- a) Inadequate access to foodstuff due to displacement from their homes hence need for support.
- b) Supply of bedding materials(blanket/mattress) due to lose of household belongings after displacements through banditry/insecurity

The initial project plan was to support 450no. Households as per the initial needs anticipation. After the needs assessment the total number of households in need of support from the 2no. Locations was 539no. Households.

The project was funded in October,2022 and implementation immediately through procurement process. The project sort quotations from various vendors to supply the items required. The supply of items was delivered to the project area and the distribution of the food items and other materials was coordinated by Bishop Wakefield Apeta who prepared the lists for households to sign when receiving food packages and other bedding materials (mattress and blankets). We have annexed all the distribution lists for food packages and bedding materials for your confirmation. Distribution of foodstuff packages and bedding items was carried out on various dates in November,2022 and early December,2022.

Project team and the beneficiaries appreciate the funding for it has impacted positively on the lives of the vulnerable community members, secured food provision in times of need and reduced households involvement in burning of charcoal for livelihoods.

We thank God for the support provided by **HUMAN ACTIV** for this noble funding for the project that alleviates human suffering by provision of foodstuff, shelter and bedding materials (bed/mattress) in time of need.

NEEDS ASSESSMENT FOR THE INTERNALLY DISPLACED 2.0 PERSONS/HOUSEHOLDS DUE BANDITRY AND INSECURITY

The project focused on 2no. needy areas of Baringo Central and North sub counties namely Bareketio ,Loruk and Bartabwa sub locations that was affected by banditry and insecurity leading to loss of life and displacement of vulnerable households.

2.1 OTHER KEY ISSUES NOTED DURING THE NEEDS ASSESSMENT EXERCISE

- a) Children in schools have no access to food hence some survive on wild fruits and vegetation.
- b) Increase in morbidity rates especially for malaria, dysentery and typhoid
- c) Parents have no capacity to pay fees due to high dependency syndrome
- d) Inadequate income forcing most households depend on charcoal burning to meet some basic needs. The burning of vegetation to produce charcoal has a negative impact on environmental conservation hence contributing to environmental degradation.
- e) Traders from exploit the displaced households and procure a sack of charcoal at between Kshs.200 to 500 to meet their daily needs,
- f) Livestock stolen hence communities left in poverty and unable to meet basic needs and no capacity to undertake restocking of animals.

3.0 COMMUNITY APPRAISAL MEETING FOR NEEDS ASSESSMENT

The community leaders from the 2no. Locations organized meetings in their respective locations to map out the needy villages and discuss other needs affecting vulnerable households.

The outcome of the meeting revealed overwhelming needs in the 2locations. The following are the needs identified in the 2locations

- a) High morbidity rates for diseases such as malaria, pneumonia and colds due vulnerable households exposure to poor weathers conditions during displacement
- b) Inadequate food and famine attributed to households mobility due to displacements and banditry
- c) Frequent theft of livestock due to surge in banditry
- d) Inadequate school attendance for school going children due to closure of schools for security purposes
- e) Exposure to wild animals i.e. hyena and snakes when vulnerable households sleep in the open
- f) Separation of family members due to vulnerable households displacements
- g) Environmental degradation due to loss of vegetation during charcoal burning and mobility of households /settling in the bushes hence utilization of forest resources

Community requested the leaders to engage the government for further assistance to address the following key issues

- a) Provision /scaling up of adequate security to reduce banditry and cattle rustling
- b) Provision of drugs and medical services via the mobile clinics to reduce the severity of diseases
- c) Provision of food to support vulnerable households
- d) Provision of adequate shelter for displaced households/families
- e) Provision of schools fees and other needs in schools
- f) Provide clothing for displaced families
- g) Vulnerable households to oriented in income generating activities to reduce dependency syndrome
