1.0 EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The project embarked on providing assistance to victims of floods in Baringo County. The purpose of the project was address flood mitigations by supporting vulnerable community members negatively affected by the floods and the schools affected by the floods and provide support in terms of relocating and provision of building materials for erection of temporary structures. Therefore, the project was based on addressing key challenges related to flooding based on the following rationale;

- a) Inadequate access to school facilities; Supporting the schools with construction materials to construct classrooms and dormitories to enhance learning and access to school facilities. Urgent requirements for iron sheets to be used for construction of temporary class rooms.
- b) Supply of food stuff-Support the schools with foodstuff to reduce hunger and ensure access to food supplies to schools affected by floods and reduce dependency on handouts
- c) Supply of canvas materials or iron sheets/timber & other building materials for temporary shelter -Inadequate shelter due to submerged homes/houses hence making families live in the open fields and exposed to mosquitoes therefore prone to malaria outbreaks & other respiratory illness
- d) Construction of temporary latrines- Inadequate sanitation facilities have contributed to open defecation hence the need to secure materials for construction of temporary latrines that can address the sanitation needs of the displaced communities and respective schools.

The initial project plan was to support 10no. schools but due part funding the schools were scaled down to 5no. and families benefitting from food support from 150no. to 75no. funding. The project covers schools and villages mostly affected by flooding in Baringo North and South sub countiesb. The report provides the progress achieved to date and the need to scale up support to implement the project in the remaining schools and the villages. The project was granted US\$ 10,000(Kshs. 1,000,000) to initiate project implementation. To this date 3no. schools have implemented the classrooms and dormitories,2no. schools are currently implementing -constructing the classrooms & dormitories while 75no. households have benefited from food packages supplied. Construction of houses has been initiated and 2no. households have done their constructions. We anticipate completion of the houses in the next 2weeks. Already 30no. households are being mobilized for sanitation improvements via Sanplat latrines.

Project team and the beneficiaries appreciate the funding for it has impacted positively on the lives of the vulnerable community members and the schools who have now access to decent shelter, secured food provision in times of hunger and access to improved sanitation.

We thank God for the support provided by HUMAN ACTIV for this noble funding for the project that alleviates human suffering by provision of food stuff, shelter and improved sanitation in time of need.

2.0 COMMUNITY MEETINGS & ENGAGEMENTS FOR PROJECT RELIEF SUPPORT

To facilitate implementation of the relief support activities the project team organized meetings in the target villages to assess and plan relevant realistic actions. The villages targeted through consultation with local church leadership are as follows;

- a) Kapkirwok
- b) Soiyo
- c) Kampi ya Samaki
- d) Ngenyin
- e) Kipkimbirwo
- f) Kapundi

The purpose of targeting these villages was due their vulnerability. Several houses had been destroyed with floods and community access to food supplies proved to be difficult and inadequate due to destruction of their farm land and livelihoods.

Due to inadequate shelter the villagers had been affected by wild animals especially hippos which reside in flood prone areas and were constantly causing havoc to community members especially at night. Destruction of homes also affected access to sanitation since their latrines have collapsed and exposed the communities to diarrheal diseases.

Therefore, the purpose of the community was to agree on the following key aspects;

- a) Mobilization of local resources to support implementation of project activities

 i.e., contribution towards construction of houses by provision of walling materials and
 engagement of unskilled labor
- b) Mobilize for provision of sand, ballast and unskilled labour during the production of sanitation slabs for sanitation improvements for vulnerable households
- c) Identify vulnerable households for food stuff packages and relief support in the respective villages
- d) Identify artisan to engaged for latrine slab production
- e) Identify vulnerable households for the support of the housing project
- f) Develop implementation schedules of the various project components i.e., Relief food provision, Support school construction of new classrooms& dormitories, Construction of houses and Sanitation development at households' level.

3.0 PROVISION & SUPPORT OF FOOD PACKAGES TO VULNERABLE FAMILIES

The project provided food stuff to 75no. families from different villages. The provision of food stuff was meant to alleviate them from hunger since most of the community members could rely on food from their farms. Most their farms had been submerged in the floods and could not be accessed. Therefore, the foodstuff provided consisted of the following food packages per household family.

4.0 CONSTRUCTION SUPPORT OF SCHOOLS AND SHELTERS FOR VULNERABLE FAMILIES & HOUSEHOLDS

4.1 Construction of shelters for Vulnerable families

The project supported the construction of houses to facilitate community members access decent shelter after their houses had been flooded. To facilitate the construction of the houses for families whose homes had been flooded the project provided the following items per affected vulnerable households;

- a) 20no. iron sheets (3m) –Dumu zas
- b) Roofing nails -2kg
- c) Transport for materials

Households and community members provided the following materials

- a) Poles for walls and roofing
- b) Unskilled and skilled labour
- c) Provide mud & wattle for the walls or provision of old roofs for walling materials

The project has supported the construction of 16no. households in the respective target villages of Baringo County. The houses have transformed community members and enabled them to have decent shelter for their children. Most of the supported families are elderly, widows and the vulnerable poor in those target villages. The following are the vulnerable families that received assistance for house &shelter construction materials to facilitate construction of houses. Currently 3no. houses are complete with 16no. under construction to be completed in by 2nd Week of September, 2021.

4.2 Support construction of classrooms & dormitories

The project supported 5no. schools to construct new classrooms since the old classrooms have been submerged into the lake. The new site where the schools were relocated required class rooms and dormitories for schools to resume. Therefore, the project embarked to support 5no. schools as per the following list

- a) Lake Baringo Mixed Secondary School
- b) Salabani Mixed Secondary school
- c) Loruk Day mixed Secondary school
- d) Ngambo Girls School
- e) Salabani primary school

Each of the school is to receive 70no. iron sheets 30gauge dumu zas and 10kg of roofing nails. The schools are to provide the following materials

- 1. Roofing poles
- 2. Super structure materials (iron sheets or bricks)
- 3. Foundation materials (sand, ballast hardcore and cement)
- 4. Payment for skilled and unskilled labour

5.0 CONSTRUCTION SUPPORT OF SANITATION IMPROVEMENTS FOR VULNERABLE HOUSEHOLDS

Construction of latrines is on-going in the various villages. The community are mobilizing key materials i.e., sand, ballast and providing unskilled labour. The project is targeting initially to have 30no. households to have latrines especially those who relocated from the flooding fields. The project has been supporting household sanitation component by providing cement, reinforcement bars and skilled labor payments. The slabs and the latrines are currently under construction and will be completed in the next two months.
